## **THE MASTER CUTLER'S REPORT, 2010-2011**

I have had a thoroughly enjoyable year but came in knowing that I would not achieve all I wanted in my tenure. My main theme has therefore been continuity and I have started a number of things with the agreement of the Wardens in order that they will continue into the future.

Other themes throughout the year have been about improving the Company's relevance, including closer links with Freeman and Friends. We have also looked at ways to grow the manufacturing sector, encourage innovation, attract investment and develop the appropriate skills.

We find ourselves in 'interesting times', the economic situation is still difficult, the financial sector remains under pressure, the public sector is retrenching and it is clear that internal spending cannot be used to spur growth. Growth needs to be export driven and this has meant that manufacturing has risen up the political agenda. This is an opportunity for us and we have seized it. As Master, I became the titular head of the Global Manufacturing Festival in March. The Master retains this position and the Company is now at the forefront of plans for a smaller festival next year and a more major event in 2013.

We have engaged more with Freeman, both through the recently formed Freeman's Committee and directly. As a result, I have been able to take forward ideas and concerns from the Freeman to meetings I have had with MPs, other influential people and the Press. I have also spent some time listening to Friend's views, they are very important to the Region and have an interest in growing manufacturing as they often support the companies involved.

I have met most MPs and many of the local politicians in the Region but have also been able to pass the message further afield. Along with various events I have attended in London, I also hosted the Lord Mayor of London and his Sheriffs at the Forfeit Feast at the end of July. In addition to the Feast and the now traditional Q and A from business leaders, he also visited two factories. They were selected because they are seeking business in Africa and the Lord Mayor was due to lead a trade mission to that Continent in September. He went away with two very clear messages – that Sheffield City Region manufactures high quality products and that it is a great place to invest.

I have been significantly impressed by the esteem in which the Company is held. The Mistress and I have been well received and generously entertained at engagements in the City of London, Edinburgh, Bristol and York as well as throughout Yorkshire.

I and the Mistress Cutler have been privileged this year to see a great deal of charitable activity. It is humbling to see how much is being done in this area and particularly by the people involved who contribute a great deal for no return other than the knowledge that they have helped in difficult circumstances.

I mentioned skills earlier on and this has been one of the major themes of the year. We held a dine and dialogue in February to bring together leaders from business and the education sector. The impact was remarkable. In the past, communication has been limited and this helped both sides to understand the requirements and challenges of the other. It is

anticipated that education will be a continuing theme and, indeed, next year the Company will establish an Education Committee to lead on this.

## **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

### **FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT**

Last year, this report said that “given the very high levels of debt, both Governmental and personal, that have accumulated in recent years, the time of reckoning was bound to come and we now face a long period of austerity. The Company will not be immune to the problems but the Members are determined to preserve the inheritance of the past and the influence of the Company”.

The painful symptoms of that austerity are now with us. Our society inevitably faces major structural change and no one likes it. Like it or not, however, they will happen.

The Cutlers’ Company is a traditional organisation and is relatively inflexible. Fortunately, in recent years, we have had a series of strategic reviews that have enabled us to foresee problems and go some way to resolve them. Another is now taking place. It is designed to ensure that we continue the process of opening up and modernising the Company whilst preserving the core activities.

In the short term, 2010/11 has not been an easy year. The catering operation did slightly better than we anticipated. The contract expires this month and we say goodbye to Sodexo with whom we have enjoyed a good relationship for a decade. New caterers then take over – more of this in the Hall’s Committee report. Dividend income increased a little but the capital values of our portfolios have followed the markets in painful volatility.

As always, the donations from Freemen and Friends are very important to the Company and we thank them for their generosity. They can also help by ensuring that the Hall is used for any appropriate activity with which they have influence. As a venue it is without equal.

After some years, I am retiring as Chairman of the Finance Committee and will be succeeded by a senior Past Master, Martin Howell. I have enjoyed the challenges over the years and am sure he will too. I wish him well. I hoped that the transfer would take place in calmer seas but it was not to be.

### **HALL'S COMMITTEE REPORT**

The main focus of the Hall’s Committee during the last twelve months has been overseeing the process to determine which organisation would hold the all important catering contract in the Cutlers’ Hall since it was felt that the time was right for the Company to go out to competitive tender.

As the result of a detailed and thorough bidding process, the contract was awarded to Kudos, a company with an outstanding reputation and considerable experience of catering in premises

such as ours. The venues they cater in, range from London, through Nottingham and up to Harrogate.

It would, however, be most remiss of me not to recognize the close relationship we have built up with Sodexo during the fourteen years that they have held the contract. They have enhanced the Hall in many ways over that time and advanced the reputation of the Cutlers' Hall as the premier Hall of its kind in the Midlands and North of England, if not the South as well.

As well as this major project, the routine tasks of looking after the Hall have continued: the integrity of the building has been maintained with much minor but important work being done on the considerable number and variety of roofs; the Beadle's flat has been made watertight after the ravages of last winter; the goods lift has been brought up to specification; the Master's facilities have been refurbished courtesy of a generous donation from a recent Past Master.

In the months ahead the Hall's Committee will be reviewing and updating the long term plan with maintenance and replacement work being put into a revised and rolling schedule. With a building such as the Cutlers' Hall, no long term plans can be writ in tablets of stone since there will always be surprises around the corner, but it will give us an opportunity to plan and budget ahead, particularly in these economically difficult times.

In closing, I would express the thanks of the Halls Committee to Colonel George Kilburn and his small but dedicated team, without whom the Hall would not be in the excellent condition it is. This year I would also like to make special mention of Andrew Kyle, the consultant engaged to assist in the process of choosing the new caterers. His contribution was invaluable and as such should be recognized publically.

## **ARCHIVIST'S REPORT**

The Company's collections continue to receive a number of gifts from people associated with the Company and from members of the public, typically cutlery and books.

There has been some repair work carried out on several of the silver candelabra, where the arms were working loose and loans of a small number of items from the silver collection continue to be made to the Millennium Galleries. .

The Joseph Rodgers' Year Knife, which was started in 1821 with 1,821 blades in it and has had a blade added for every year since then. It has been returned to the stewardship of the Hawley Collection Trust at Kelham Island Industrial Museum. The Knife belongs to Stanley Tools (UK) and was made over to the Hawley Trust in the late 1990s for refurbishment prior to the addition of the 2000<sup>th</sup> blade, celebrating the millennium. In order for it to be seen by members of the public, it was loaned to the Cutlers' Company and placed in the Muniment Room in the Hall. The Knife will now be display at Kelham Island.

Volunteers have continued to digitise a number of books from the Company archives, notably the Trade Mark registers from the late 19<sup>th</sup> century, and a number of Past Mistresses have been adding information to a collection of photographs of events at the Hall.

The Hall has been the venue for two projects by Media Studies students from Sheffield Hallam University. One group made a ten minute film – a mystery – where the Reception Room and stairs made an impressive location for the story. The second was a virtual tour showing aspects of the main rooms and halls.

The website continues to attract a number of enquiries, mainly about family history, but with many queries relating to cutlery and silver repairs, purchasing Sheffield cutlery and tools and requests for tours. The Company was involved in Sheffield's 'Galvanise' festival in March, by offering tours of the Hall and a presentation by the Archivist on the history and role of the Cutlers' Company.

## **STRATEGY STEERING GROUP REPORT**

The Strategy was written in 2007 and then amended in 2009. The economic situation has not improved significantly but somewhat greater clarity means that it is now appropriate to review the Strategy. A Strategy Review Group has therefore been established for the 2011-12 year. Actions to implement the Strategy in the past year are below.

A Freeman's Committee has been established and this now channels views to the Company and the Master Cutler as appropriate. This has proved a great success and is being expanded. Freeman will have an opportunity to meet the Committee before the Installation on 4 October.

Recruiting of Freeman remains a priority. In the past, whereas the approval of a proposed Freeman had a clear procedure, recruiting was somewhat unstructured. A Member of the Company has therefore been appointed as Freeman's Ambassador with the specific role of recruiting new Freeman.

A Friends' Advisor was appointed this year to act as a link between current Friends and the Company and to find new Friends if appropriate. The demand has been significant and the Company has therefore agreed to increase the number of Friends from 40 to 55. Recruitment has been successful and there are currently 55 Friends.

The financial situation has been kept under permanent review this year. The impact of the changes introduced in 2009 will be considered by the Strategy Review Group.

The Website continues to evolve with an increasing number of good news stories from Freeman being added and even an icon from East Midland Trains where trains can be booked. This generates a small commission to the Company.

The Master has done much to champion manufacturing in the Region. He chairs the South Yorkshire Manufacturing Forum which is now the Manufacturing arm of the Local Enterprise Partnership. He was also head of the Global Manufacturing Festival in March 2011 and it is anticipated that future Masters will also agreed to 'head up' this annual event.

There has been a step change in education this year with the recognition that the system should prepare young people for work. The Company is in the forefront of this movement along with the local authority and various education providers. This role will be taken on by the newly formed Education Committee next year.

### **THE 375<sup>th</sup> CUTLERS' FEAST**

The Principal Guest at the 375<sup>th</sup> Cutlers' Feast was the Lord Bhattacharyya, an industrialist and professor at Warwick University who, through his Warwick Manufacturing Group has helped to revitalize manufacturing in the area including Jaguar - Land Rover (JLR). He was joined by, Dr John Sentamu, the Archbishop of York and the former Sheffield MP, Richard Caborn, alongside invited guests from the region, industry, the civil service, the military and City of London Livery Masters and Prime Wardens.

The Senior Warden, Mrs Pamela Liversidge, firstly said that she delighted that manufacturing's valuable contribution to our economy is being recognized at long last. Manufacturers play a major role in improving our balance of payments through exports. Many businesses in the heartland of the country's manufacturing region are doing well. However, whilst manufacturers and engineers, expect to innovate Government must help by creating an internationally competitive business environment. The Coalition has made a positive start but there is still a long way to go to reduce the burden of bureaucracy on business. Finance is needed especially for small businesses to grow. This also requires work. We must also have the right type of skills. The creation of one Million apprenticeships by 2013 is a big step forward but there must be jobs for these apprentices to go into and we need to address other issues including the public perception that vocational and practical learning is somehow inferior to academic learning. We need to convince our young people, especially the brightest and the best, that engineering and technology provide attractive and sustainable careers. Innovative and practical schemes are being put in place in this Region and it is these, as well as a positive attitude to vocational qualifications, which will help us tackle our skills and educational shortcomings, and ultimately help us to grow our manufacturing base.

The Master emphasized that Sheffield was 'back on the map' and expressed his pleasure at the fact that manufacturing was rising up the agenda.

The Lord Bhattacharyya focused on innovation. He said that it was vital that Government support innovation by backing partnerships, research, and capital investment having been scared of having an Industrial policy because of the mistakes of the past. Our problems were the results of a bad industrial policy, built on arrogance about captive markets and life support for failures. We have made a start in changing that and there is now an understanding of the essential role of manufacturing. Now we need a sustainable, long term focus on manufacturing. We need to have faith in our talents along with a belief in our ability to succeed through:

Partnership; Research; and Investment. These are simple strategies, but good business has never been about complex mantras. It is about finding a growing market and building a useful product. He concluded by saying that Hallamshire has long known how to lead and was in a good position to do so now.

Finally, Richard Caborn responded for the guests, emphasizing the need for Government to understand the requirements of manufacturing and the Region. He then made a tongue in cheek suggestion that a number of people currently working in Sheffield could perhaps be put into senior civil service jobs in order to facilitate this. He concluded in thanking the Master for his very kind hospitality, on behalf of all the guests.

The following day, the Master and Mistress hosted a visit to the Advanced Manufacturing Research Centre to see modern manufacturing in action. A small party also had the opportunity to visit Independent Forgings and Alloys where they saw a modern form of the blacksmith's art using modified fork lift trucks to manipulate billets of various metals to prepare them for further work. This allowed people to see a piece of red hot metal worked in a forge, prior to being sent for machining to make high end products such as turbines for jet engines.

#### **THE 2011 FORFEIT FEAST**

The Forfeit Feast took place this year on Friday 29 July. The principal guests were The Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of the City of London together with the two London Sheriffs.

The Lord Mayor, Alderman Michael Bear, the Lady Mayoress along with Sheriff, Fiona Woolf and her husband and Sheriff Richard Sermon and his wife were met by the Master Cutler at Doncaster Station and moved directly to two factory visits at Macalloy and at AESSEAL. They expressed much interest in both businesses with the Lord Mayor making the point that, as a Civil Engineer, he is from the 'real economy'

In the afternoon The Lord Mayor and the two Sheriffs met various business leaders in the Cutlers' Hall. The Lord Mayor, in his role as ambassador for UK financial services, addressed the meeting but being a Civil Engineer he had arranged for Chris Cummings, CEO of the CityUK, to deal with detailed financial issues. A lively and useful session ensued and various questions were raised with the tone taking account of the fact that the Lord Mayor is an Engineer and Chris Cummings is a Yorkshireman. Separately, the Mistress Cutler took the Lady Mayoress, Mr Woolfe and Mrs Sermon on a visit to the iconic Corrin Mellor, a silverware designer and manufacturer in Hathersage.

In the evening the Lord Mayor and his party, together with Lieutenant Colonel Richard Martin, the Sword Bearer, attended the Forfeit Feast. During the evening, the Master Cutler and the Lord Mayor spoke on the current economic situation and particularly the difficulties with finance. They found a good deal of common ground and agreed on the increasing importance of manufacturing to the economic recovery. The Master Cutler presented the Lord Mayor with a sterling silver Sheffield hall-marked pen knife bearing a facsimile of the Lord Mayor's signature.

The evening concluded with a musical interlude by the Fanfare and Drums of the South Yorkshire Police. The lively performance provided a fitting finale to a very good feast.

## **FREEMEN'S EVENTS**

### **Freemen's Dinner**

The Freeman's Dinner was held on Monday 6 December 2010 and was attended by 253 Freeman, Friends and their guests. The toast to the Company was given by Mrs S Battersby, a new Freeman. The Master Professor William B Speirs responded with a toast to The Guests.

### **Freemen's Luncheon**

The Freeman's Luncheon, normally held near to Saint George's Day, was early this year to avoid a clash with the bank holiday granted for the Royal Wedding. It was held on 14 April 2011 and attended by 68 Freeman, Friends and their guests.

### **Master Cutler's Golf Day 11<sup>th</sup> August 2011**

37 Freeman and friends enjoyed a windy and damp day at Hallamshire Golf Club on 11<sup>th</sup> August 2011 to compete for the Master Cutler's Putter and the Ryder Cup Salver. The weather didn't seem to dampen the enthusiasm of the players who enjoyed a buffet lunch and prize giving after the golf.

The Master Cutler's Putter is awarded to the Freeman with the best individual score and this year, in conditions that were far from easy, Gordon Panter, with a handicap of 9, returned an excellent score of 44. The Ryder Cup Salver, signed by all the members of the 1957 victorious Ryder Cup team, is awarded to the pair with the best better-ball stapleford score. This year the winners were Paul Dawson and Philip Prince with a score of 47 points, winning on a count back on the last 9 holes.

Hatfields Jaguar had generously donated prizes for the longest drive and the nearest the pin on the 17<sup>th</sup>. These were won by Philip Prince and Paul Dawson respectively – clearly a winning combination! Other prizes were given to the highest scoring guest, David Graham, and the highest scoring pair not eligible for the Ryder Cup Salver, Chris Blanksby and Ian Ledward.

The Master Cutler presented prizes and it was also a great pleasure to see Sir Hugh and Lady Sykes who joined the party for lunch.

### **Other Events**

Various Freeman's events were held throughout the year, including a Factory visit to DavyMarkham and various networking events in the Hall. There was also a visit to the Jaguar Factory at Castle Bromwich on 6 September.

## **MASTER CUTLER'S CHALLENGE**

This year the Master Cutler chose not to follow the normal path of the Challenge but instead turned the focus on helping young people to find employment. He therefore established a challenge which went out to both schools and businesses. He asked Business & Education South Yorkshire to administer this year's challenge. The aim was to help 1000 young people improve their employment prospects.

The format was similar to that of previous years, where the Master Cutler gave £50 to anyone who accepted the challenge and then asked them to make what they could of it. Some, particularly businesses, have used the £50 to raise significant amounts of money, much of which will go to help providing those opportunities for 1000 young people. Others, particularly, schools, have used the money to raise some cash but mainly to develop an entrepreneurial spirit amongst those involved and therefore help to equip them for life in work in the future.

The Challenge has been a significant success; 15 schools and 62 businesses took up the challenge. It succeeded in raising a good deal of money but, more importantly, it has engaged significant numbers of young people who, by the experience they have gained, will have improved their prospects of finding employment.

The success of the Challenge was celebrated at a Gala dinner on 29 September 2011 where prizes were awarded for the best return on the £50 investment, the most entrepreneurial idea and the best team leader. There will also be the Master Cutler's Award for the team which did most to further the aims of the challenge.

All in all, this year's Master Cutler's Challenge has been a unique opportunity to help young people in the Region to improve their job prospects. At the Gala Dinner, the Master Cutler thanked all those involved and particularly Business & Education South Yorkshire for the very hard work throughout the year to make this year's Challenge a great success.

#### **THE CUTLERS' COMPANY CHARITABLE TRUST**

The Cutlers' Company Grass Roots Fund is administered by the South Yorkshire Community Foundation. As envisaged in last year's Annual Review benefits have accrued for the first time from the Grass Roots Scheme. The capital value of the fund is £244,531. This includes a generous donation from Michael and Barbara Mallett. The first distributions of income from this capital under the Grassroots Scheme have been made. The beneficiaries are:

## **SOUTH YORKSHIRE POLICE AWARDS**

The Eighteenth Annual Awards made by the Company to recognise exemplary service were presented at the Cutlers' Hall on Wednesday 13 July 2011 by the Master Cutler.

### **Group Award – Force Incident Managers.**

This year's group award went to the Force Incident Managers, a group of inspectors who provide 24/7 cover for South Yorkshire Police. The initial response to an incident is often vital. Immediate and appropriate action can deal with an incident rapidly and result in a better outcome with more effective use of resources. The Force Incident Managers provide the immediate control and management of incidents reported to the police. This particularly applies to major and critical incidents. They have, at their disposal, all police assets including the SY99 Helicopter, Armed Response, Hostage Negotiators and Underwater Search Teams. They are trained to command firearms deployments and to manage and control critical incidents. In recent years, they have commanded incidents which have varied from an aeroplane crash in Rotherham through shootings in Sheffield, to bomb warnings and chemical suicides. To be effective, they need a thorough understanding of both South Yorkshire Police and all partner agencies.

Their decisions to act or, in some cases, to stand back can have a very significant impact. They make life and death decisions on a daily basis and their ability to make the right decision and remain calm is constantly tested. They consistently get the right resources to the right place at the right time to deal with incidents. They are held in high esteem by colleagues and, in the spirit of providing excellent service to the public, have invited various groups to Atlas Court to see how an emergency call is dealt with. The Master and Mistress Cutler have been to this facility as invited guests. Not only do they provide the right result but they are vital in ensuring that scarce resources are used to best effect.

### **Individual Award – Sgt Suzanne Snowden – Wentworth Valley SNT.**

Sergeant Suzanne Snowden leads the Wentworth Valley Safer Neighbourhood Team which covers Maltby in Rotherham. She takes a community led approach and is considered inspirational by her team of police and community support officers. She is part of the Community and, apart from being visible through patrols and her presence at events, she involves herself and her family in initiatives even when off duty. She has a great ability to engage the public as evidenced by her instigation of two new neighbourhood watch schemes, the public's improved trust leading to better information. The result is reduced crime and anti social behaviour.

As well as engaging the public, she has also taken a multi agency approach, introducing initiatives such as joint patrols with youth workers and drug/alcohol advisors as well as communicating directly with repeat victims and providing diversionary activities.

Her drive and leadership along with her belief in the value of policing in partnership with the public have led to huge improvements and confidence and a reduced fear of crime and anti-social behaviour. She is a worthy winner of this year's Cutlers' Company Individual Award.

The James Neill Trust Fund made generous donations to charities nominated by the Group and Individual winners. Force Incident Managers nominated Macmillan Cancer Support Neighbourhood Watch which received £500 and Sergeant Snowden nominated Bluebell Wood Children's Hospice which received £250. Cheques to representatives from each charity were presented by Mrs Nina Peel, who represented the Trust.

In presenting the awards, the Master Cutler said that it had been very difficult to select the winners from the very high quality nominations this year. He congratulated the winners but also took the opportunity to comment upon how vital the South Yorkshire Police are to all of us and particularly business, as we can operate in security. He then asked the Deputy Chief Constable to take back the message that there was recognition of the excellent job that the police are doing in very difficult circumstances.

The Deputy Chief Constable thanked the Master Cutler for his kind words and said that he took great pleasure in being present at these awards.

Pam Liversidge is a Chartered Mechanical Engineer. During a career of almost forty years in heavy industry, she has worked as a Chartered Engineer in the manufacturing industry, including four years creating her own business to manufacture specialist metal powders by atomisation, in addition to five years as a senior executive in the electricity industry during its privatisation. She now has interests in engineering and medical device companies as well as holding several non-executive directorships (see below).

She is a Fellow of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers and was its first woman President from May 1997 to May 1998, a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineers, of the City & Guilds Institute and of the Royal Society of Arts; Chairman of Governors of Sheffield High School (a GDST school); a Member of the Company of Cutlers in Hallamshire where she will be elected Master on 4 October 2011 (the first woman to hold this office) and a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Engineers. She is a Guardian of the Sheffield Assay Office. She was a Vice-President of RedR, 1996-1999

She is a non-executive Director of the Rainbow Seed Fund, a non-executive Director of the Chesterfield Royal Foundation Trust Hospital and was local area Chairman of Yorkshire Bank's Financial Solutions Centre in Sheffield 2006-2009. She is a Director of Quest Investments Ltd which has interests in engineering and medical device companies and commercial property. She is a Director of Whirlow Grange Conference Centre and a member of the Trustee Board of the City and Guilds of London Institute. Pam has received Honorary Doctorates from six UK universities.

In the 1999 New Year's Honours List, Pam was awarded the OBE for her services to the Institution of Mechanical Engineers and was made a Deputy Lieutenant of South Yorkshire in October 1999. She held office as High Sheriff of South Yorkshire from April 2004 – April 2005.

She is a strong advocate of vocational education and enjoys golf and gardening. She lives in the Peak District of Derbyshire with Doug, her husband (a Past Master Cutler) as well as spending several weeks each year at their home on the Gulf Coast of Florida.
